## Gift Day, Coinboxes & Bank Account Report by Frank Duns - Treasurer

There are three matters to bring to your attention this month: the Gift Day, coin boxes and the new bank account.

The Gift day was a great success raising a substantial £2764. I would like to thank all of you who donated to this as this method of fundraising is vital for maintaining our properties.

I would also like to thank those of you who use our coin boxes. So far, with a small number yet to be handed in, they have raised £746.52, a considerable amount,

especially when it consists of mostly one and two pence coins. This method of giving has raised a large amount of money over the years and if you don't have a coin box they are available in the church or you can ask your elder or myself for one.

#### The new bank account.

As I previously explained we're having to change banks due to the RBS closing in Penicuik as we require a night safe facility for insurance purposes.



By the time you read this our

new account will be open, a month later than anticipated, due to major problems receiving the correct paperwork and application forms, of which there were a considerable amount.

If you use online banking then it's simply a matter of cancelling your current standing order to St Mungo's and setting up a new one with the new St Mungo's Bank of Scotland account details.

I have already e-mailed members who give by standing order, whose contact details I have, with the new account sort code and account number and I will be giving out the new bank details, and standing order mandates if required, to those of you who give by standing order after the Sunday services(s).

If you don't use online banking then it's simply a matter of completing and taking the new standing order mandate, which has all the new account details on it, to your bank and cancelling your standing order to St Mungo's RBS account.

If you are an RBS customer there are options available since the RBS in Penicuik is now closed. You can go to any RBS branch, Peebles, Dalkeith Edinburgh etc., or you can use the mobile RBS bank which will be in the B&M car park between 2.50 p.m. and 3.35 p.m. on Wednesdays.

If you are unable to attend church please contact me on 678990, or your elder, and I'll ensure you receive the new bank account details for online banking or a standing order mandate. For obvious reasons I cannot publish these in the Mungo Messenger.

I apologise for any inconvenience this may cause you, especially to those of you who are RBS Penicuik customers, but this is due to the delay in the opening of the new account.

There is what is called a "bounce back" in place between banks. This means that although your standing order will be to our closed bank account, the RBS will transfer that donation to our new BOS account.

This process goes on for a considerable length of time so there is no immediate problem. It is, however, in your best interest, and the best interests of St Mungo's irrespective of which bank you use, to change your standing order mandate at your earliest possible convenience.

It's imperative that you cancel your old standing order because with the "bounce back" between banks in place, both standing orders would be payable.

## The Great Giveaway : Messy Church - 24 June

A Our theme in June was taken this story in Mark 10, and Jesus response to the man searching for eternal life.

As Jesus started on his way, a man ran up to him and fell on his knees before him. "Good teacher," he asked, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" "Why do you call me good?" Jesus answered. "No one is good-except God alone. You know the commandments: 'You shall not murder, you shall not commit



adultery, you shall not steal, you shall not give false testimony, you shall not defraud, honour your father and mother." "Teacher," he declared, "all these I have kept since I was a boy."

Jesus looked at him and loved him. "One thing you lack," he said. "Go, sell everything you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven. Then come, follow me.

With the sun shining we took to the garden for some of our activities, alongside the barbecue which would be enjoyed later in the afternoon.

### Our activities included

Bird Feeder - Using rolls of cardboard, corn syrup, bird seed and cheerios cereal, attached to wire hangers, rolling the feeder in syrup and seed. This was an activity that everyone ended up with sticky fingers. The finished feeders were hung on a tree in the darden.

We talked about how all of God's creatures are important and that we can help feed the birds.

Soup in a Jar - From a range of ingredients including parmesan cheese, pasta and lentils, we filled a jar, finishing it off with a tag, and a sticker on each side, attaching the tag with a piece of cord or ribbon. To cook simply tip contents into a pan, add water and simmer for 20 minutes.

We talked about how Jesus tells us that we should be generous and give our possessions away to others. There are many people who do not have lots to eat in our community and so we are making these soup kits to give to them.



Foam Cross - We decorated small crosses, adding a message to our friends and others. We talk about how we should love God above all our possessions and stuff.

Get Well Cards - We made and decorated cards, choosing a message for the inside We talked about sending a 'get well' card to folks we show we care for them. Again - another way to 'give' to others.

Hygiene Kits - We made up ziplock bags on useful toiletries for both boys and girls, with items like Toothpaste, Toothbrush, Soap, Shampoo, Cream Rinse, 1 Tissue pack

We talked about how Jesus tells us that we should be generous and give our possessions away to others. There are people who do not have many of the things we do and that we can help by giving items to a mission for them and to know that we care about them. These kits will go to the Edinburgh City Mission.

## Sponsored Walk - 9 June Report by Jim Paterson

The sun shone on the 11 walkers, and Rosie the dog, as they set off from St. Mungo's to walk the Tweed valley from Cardronna to Innerleithen. Along the river and over the hills, with a call for ice creams at Caldwell's in Innerleithen made it a great day out. Some walkers even turned out in their shorts.

We arrived at Cardronna station, which was an intermediate station on the Peebles to Innerleithen extension which eventually linked up with the Waverley Line at Galashiels, from 1864 to 1962. The old station waiting room is home to Nashy's Coffee House providing a great place to park up and grab a bacon roll before heading off on the walk.

We shared the walk with the morning golfers on the Macdonald Cardronna course, before crossing the River Tweed over the Woodend footbridge to the north side. Meeting cyclists on the route of the now disused railway line became a regular occurrence on the path, with the call 'cyclists' becoming a regular feature, for those approaching us from behind. We commented that not many bicycles seem to be equipped with bells these days.

Eventually we reached Glenormiston Halt, a rest point where some kept on the riverside walk, heading for Innerleithen, whilst others set off up the hills toward Velvet Hall.
