New Minister voted a success - Sunday 30 April

The Rev John Urguhart receives overwhelming vote to be our next minister.

The Rev John Urquhart received a vote of 101 for and only 1 against being our next minister at St. Mungo's, after the service on Sunday April 30th.

Our Interim Moderator Yvonne Atkins introduced John to us and detailed the procedure we would follow after the service, with all St. Mungo's members present casting their vote either for or against accepting John to be our new minister.

John opened with a call to worship that had us all involved with the responses.

His time with the children was really for us all in the congregation. He took us on a journey, and what we would need for that journey.

In our backpack we would need map, so we could plan our route and know where we were, some water, sunscreen to protect us from the burning suns rays, and a waterproof in case a shower came by. John had also brought an umbrella to keep off the rain. Last but not

least, a walking pole, to support us on our

journey. When we journey with God we have His support at all times and should rejoice that He will always look after us.

John used the readings from Peter and Luke, read by Christine Jackson and Sandy Robertson, taking the role of Cleopas on the journey from Jerusalem to Emmaus with a friend, after the crucifixion and resurrection. He started as Jesus walked up to and spoke to them. Neither recognised Jesus and were baffled that this stranger knew nothing of what had nappened in Jerusalem.

The story unfolds as the conversation continued, and how the deliverer everyone hoped for was also God's servant who suffered for our wrong doing. John continued with a story of Justin, the pagan. Following his search to be a philosopher, and his discovery

of God.

His inspiring sermon was followed by his vision of the future for St. Mungo's, taking our congregation on an exciting journey.

The vote was taken after John preached the service, and after the result announcement the members present signed the Call which will be returned to Presbytery.

If you are a member and missed the service, vote and Call, you can still sign the Call either on Sat and Sunday 6&7 and 13&14 May in the Church, or ask your Elder for a mandate to sign which will add to the number of members signing the Call for John to be our next minister.

The Call will go before Presbytery end of June to be sustained.

A new chapter in the life of St. Mungo's church is about to commence.





Easter at St. Mungo's Report by Jim Paterson

Easter week started with a Celebration of Gifts Praise Service on Palm Sunday 9 April.

Led by Joan Cape with music provided by Graham McDonald on piano, Caroline Toms on Guitar and vocals, and Neil Cape on bass guitar. The service covered the use of our gifts from God and how we can use them. Joan interviewed a number of members to find out how they used their 'gifts'. The readings reflected how God wants us to use our gifts and talents in His name. A great selection of uplifting hymns were sung.

Following Palm Sunday, we continued the Easter Week on Monday 10th with the Rev Ian Cathcart leading the congregation at St. Mungo's. With members from all the other churches in Penicuik joining our own





The Good Friday service on the 14 April looked at St. Luke's account of our Lord's crucifixion. Through sermon reflection and song we reflected on that death. God commends His love to us, that while we were yet sinners Christ died for us.

Hugh's sermon compared the Rev Sydney Chambers, the fictional vicar of Granchester in Cambridgeshire, an amateur sleuth, penned by author James Runcie, the son of Robert Runcie the late Archbishop of Canterbury in the 1980's, and how his 'who done it' stories are

supposed to improve our memories, to solve the mystery.

What of the mysteries of God? Can they ever be solved? Why did Jesus die the death that He did? This is the mystery that confronts us every Good Friday. Hugh explored the variety of solutions put forward over time, before drawing his conclusion.

Easter Sunday started early for the Penicuik Churches. Some 20 members of the churches in Penicuik met at 5.30am beside St. Kentigern church ruin, behind St. Mungo's church, wrapped up well against the 4 degree temperature.


The Rev Ruth Halley called us to worship, before we sang Hymn 782 'Lord of Life we come to you.' The reading from Mark 15: 33-47 described the death and burial of Jesus on Good Friday. A short prayer was said before the group proceeded in silent prayer to Broomhill, to greet the sunrise, signalling the resurrection..



We reached the top of the hill just as the sun was beginning

its ascent into the sky. The reading for Mark 16: 1-20 described the resurrection of Jesus, our reason for gathering here on this new day.

We followed a short Easter prayer and Hymn, before Ruth then led an Easter Litany, a prayer and the benediction. Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed! Alleluia.



The Easter Sunday morning continued with the 11.00am service led by Rev Hugh Davidson. He started with the reasons for our Easter celebration, life over death, good over evil, love over hate, hope over despair, rejoicing in the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ from the dead. Christ is risen, risen indeed. Alleluia!

Bill Webster read from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, chapter 15: verses 35-50, where Paul talks of the difference between earthly bodies and heavenly bodies, mortality and immortality, weakness and

strength, using Adam to illustrate the difference between our earthly and heavenly bodies.

Margaret Webster continued with St. John chapter 20 verses 1-18, where John relates Mary Magdalene discovering the stone rolled back, and the Lord taken from the tomb, the disciples investigation, and Mary later meeting the angels, and seeing her Lord.

Hugh explored the readings starting with Paul's letter to the Corinthians where Paul describes the resurrection and Jesus as a new creation, and as the last Adam. How a crucified carpenter became a life giving spirit with a capacity to create us anew, and how to understand it. We concluded with the celebration of Holy Communion, before closing with 'Thine be the Glory'.

Tom was joined by friends Cate Anderson, Conall Ross, Megan Gardiner, Ben Collins, and Meg Laird-Drummond.

The first Act opened with Tom and Megan leading the group singing 'Seasons of Love' from the musical 1993 rock musical RENT, loosely based on Puccini's opera La Bohème.



Tom graduated from The MGA Academy of Performing Arts, having received an HND in Musical Theatre after three years of training. He was Heavily involved in the Edinburgh Fringe, both performance-wise and creatively, including performing in the Edinburgh production of 'Spring Awakening'.

Megan Gardiner fell in love with musical theatre at the age of 13, and is now a 3rd year Musical theatre student at the MGA Academy of Performing Arts in Edinburgh, training for a full-time musical theatre qualification.



Conall continued with 'Younger than Springtime', from the 1949 Rodgers and Hammerstein musical South Pacific. Conall has played on larger stages such as Perth Concert Hall; whilst also completing formal Musical Theatre training.

Cate then took to the stage to sing 'I Feel Pretty', for the 1957 musical West side story. Cate is now an HND Musical Theatre student at the MGA Academy of Performing Arts in Edinburgh.

Meg followed with "Journey to the Past", a song from the 1997 20th Century Fox animated feature film, Anastasia. Ben Collins then took centre stage for 'Out There', a song from the 1996 Disney animated film The Hunchback of

Notre Dame. We continued with 'Corner of the Sky' from the 1972 musical Pippin, before Cate returned to sing 'Don't Rain on my Parade' from the 1964 musical Funny Girl.

As we headed for the end of the first act Meg introduced us to the first Phantom of the Opera songs 'Wishing You Were Somehow Here Again', which was followed by the group closing with the well known signature overture from Phantom.

After the interlude break the group returned for Act 2, starting with Meg singing 'I'm a Star' written by Scott Alan. This was followed by 'The Streets of Dublin', from the musical The man of no importance, with music by Stephen Flaherty.

Conall took us back to West side Story with 'Maria', who is the leading female character in the film and theatrical version of West Side Story.



Meg changed the pace with 'As long as he needs me'. from the musical Oliver. Meg will be playing Nancy in this years Fringe presentation by Captivate Theatre at the new Gilded Balloon in Rose Street, at the Rose Theatre.

The Monty Python 2005 musical comedy Spamalot, was the source of our next song, 'The Song that Goes Like This'. We returned to music composed by Andrew Lloyd Webber. 'Till I Hear you Sing', from Love Never Dies. Based on the book is by Lloyd Webber and Ben Elton.

We were heading for the end of our evening, which would not be complete without a song or two from the musical Les Miserables, starting with 'A Heart Full of Love', followed by 'One Day More', 'I dreamed a dream' before the shows most famous song 'Bring Him Home'.

A fantastic evening from a group with outstanding musical talent that together provided a well balanced production for our audience.

The Unforgiving Servant: Messy Church - 30 April

We took the parable of the king who wanted to settle accounts with his servants. As he began the settlement, a man who owed him ten thousand bags of gold was brought to

him. Since he was not able to pay, the master ordered that he and his wife and his children and all that he had be sold to repay the debt. At this the servant fell on his knees before him. 'Be patient with me,' he begged, 'and I will pay back everything.' The servant's master took pity on him, canceled the debt and let him go.

But when that servant went out, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred silver coins. He grabbed him and began to choke him. 'Pay back what you owe me!' he demanded. His fellow servant fell to his knees and begged him, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay it back.' But he refused. Instead, he went off and had the man thrown into prison until he could pay the debt. 'You wicked servant,' said the master to the servant, 'I cancelled all that debt of yours because you begged me to. Shouldn't you have had mercy on your fellow servant just as I had on you?' In anger his master handed him over to the jailers to be thrown into jail until he should pay back all he owed.



The crafts were based on prison cells and bars, and how forgiveness can be really hard.

A **Pencil holder** is not only useful, this one using ribbon and tape to hold it together. Just like life, when we fall out with friends or even family, and we need to forgive others to fix the relationship. God's love is like the tape/ribbon we used: it holds us (and our friendships) together.



Broken Biscuits not only was good to eat, but when we broken it reminded us how much it hurts to fall out with a friend, and to make up again, if we can. If we love one another like God loves us, we can mend the broken friendship.

Outside in the garden we had **Floating boats**, putting marbles one by one to see how long it takes before they capsized. We talked about how the servant borrowed more and more money. He couldn't pay it back, and in the end his greed got him into trouble. We need to know when to stop before we get into deep water (trouble)!

Our **Obstacle course** in the garden saw the children race round pulilng a bag. David Hogg kept the time. At the end each returned without the bag. How much quicker they were. We talked about how good it feels to unburden ourselves from baggage – to pay what we owe/ take our fair punishment or to forgive someone for a wrong done.


The small prison cell used straws as bars, and every prisoner ends up in shackles. Ours were made of tinfoil, which Andrew would later wear in his prison cell. For the younger children we used paper chains made upas shackles. We talked about how terrible it would have been for the servant to be thrown into jail with his arms and legs in shackles.



The big one of the day had to be the JUNK prison cell. Our large prison cell was fully

kitted out with bars, and would be the home for Andrew Don who would play the unforgiving servant in the church at celebration time.

Our time in the church for the celebration talked about the parable of the unforgiving servant and what forgiveness means. Sheila Anderson led the story with Andrew playing the part of the unforgiving servant, explaining how God offers forgiveness for all those who repent.



The children wrote something down that they had done that they wished they hadn't and would like forgiven for. Sheila produced a paper shredder that they could shred their note,

while explaining how God can take our sins away. The celebration also featured the puppets and song to explain the meaning of forgiveness.
