Penicuik Alpha

Does God care about me? What kind of life does he want me to live? If I pray, is there anyone at the other end? Big questions that most of us probably ask at some time or another. If you are looking for answers to any of these questions, why not come along to the Penicuik Alpha which is starting early next month?



Alpha is an eight-week exploration of the Christian faith, and people from all sorts of backgrounds and age-groups come along. Some would say they were Christians already and others would say they weren't at all; and some would say they haven't really decided what they believe. It really is for everybody.

Each evening starts off with a light meal followed by a video talk (about 30 minutes) on a particular theme, e.g. Who is Jesus?, Why and how should I pray?. How does God guide us?. Does God heal today?. After that there's a chance to chat together in a relaxed atmosphere about anything arising from the talk. Everyone's views and questions are welcome, but nobody will ever be put on the spot.

Penicuik Alpha is being held in St James the Less church hall at the top of Broomhill Road. It will be on Thursday evenings (7.00pm) for eight weeks (with a break for school holidays), starting on 4 October and finishing on 29 November.

From the Manse - Rev John Urquhart

Dear friends

Abraham's story (Genesis 12-25) is one of following God's call, trusting in God's promise. Yet he made a lot of missteps and mistakes along the way. At times, he clung to the old familiar securities, even being deceitful at times, because he hadn't fully learned to trust God.





Timothy Keller, a Presbyterian minister in New York, tells of four crises in Abraham's life, each one more intense than the last. First, he had to leave behind his home and culture in his initial journey. Later, he had to leave his family and trust in a future promise of land, when he didn't own any of it (except a burial cave,

purchased late) and he lived in a nomadic tent all his days. Then, he was to leave his future economic security in God's hands and trust in God's promise of a son, even though he and his wife were well on in years. Finally, he was challenged to give up his son, the child who had been promised him, on the mountains of Moriah.

Each time, it was as if God was saying to him: 'This is not your foundation; this is not where you should find your security. Your security is in me.' Abraham changed, Abraham became different through this process, and we look at him now as the father of all who have faith, the one who trusted God's promise, the one who was 'waiting for the city which God has designed and built, the city with permanent foundations.' (Hebrews 11:10)

Where do we find our ultimate security, our foundations? Is it in God and God's unshakeable promises to us in Jesus, who gave up everything for us?
