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Sophie McDonald - Clarinet and voice

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The South Church was filled with over 200 people on Saturday 26 August to hear Sophie McDonald perform a concert of song and clarinet. The audience were captivated for over 2 hours, with only a 30 minute interlude, listening to a wide range of music styles and songs. Sophie was joined by her father Graham McDonald accompanying her on

The concert was Sophie's idea to help contribute towards the cost of her forthcoming classes at the Junior Conservatoire in Glasgow in September. This prestigious training opportunity was won following a series of auditions, in the face of considerable competition.

The concert started the first Act with Sophie singing a selection of songs. Opening with the well known 'I could have danced all

night' by Frederick Loewe/ Alan Jay Lerner, following with a classical piece Mozart's 'L'Ho Perduta'. Continuing the classical theme we heard 'Maria Wiegenlied', written in 1912 by Max Reger. Music from the shows included a selection that we all recognised. Sophie started with 'Out of my dreams' from the Rogers and Hammerstein hit musical Oklahoma. Continuing the music of Richard Rogers and Oscar Hammerstein, we were enthralled with 'If I loved you' from the musical Carousel. No music from the shows is complete without a number from the Andrew Lloyd Weber pen, and Sophie chose 'Think of Me' from the 2004 musical Phantom of the Opera.

We headed back to 1929 for the Thomas "Fats" Waller rendition of 'Ain't Misbehavin', Fats said the song was written while "lodging" in alimony prison, and that is why he was not "misbehaving".

The first Act drew to a rapturous conclusion with 'No one else', from the 2012 Broadway show Natasha, Pierre & the Great Comet of 1812, written by composer/lyricist Dave Malloy.

Act 2 saw Sophie on clarinet, commencing with 'Sonata in E flat major Op.167' for clarinet and piano, written in 1921 by Camille Saint-Saens. Sophie played all four movements, Allegretto, Allegro Animato, Lento, and Molto Allegro.

Drawing breath she continued with 'Sonata in E flat major' by Felix Mendelssohn, the clarinet being the only wind instrument for which Felix Mendelssohn wrote any solo works. Sophie played the second movement, 'Andante'.

Bringing a bit of jazz into the performance, we heard 'Etudes on themes of Gershwin' by Paul Harvey, with Sophie playing the 1930 song 'I got rhythm'.

Returning to classical pieces, this time Mozart 'Clarinet Concerto in A K622'. written in 1791, Sophie playing the second movement 'Adagio'. The Finale of the concert was one of the Gerald Finzi chamber works, 'Five Bagatelles Op.23', Sophie playing all five movements Prelude, Romance, Carol, Forlana, and Fughetto.

A standing ovation of applause filled the church with appreciation for this barely 15 year old student, allowing us to enjoy such talent. We all look forward to hearing Sophie in future years as she develops her talent and skills, starting with her classes at the Junior Conservatoire in Glasgow.


Rev John Urguhart - A new beginning

The Rev John Urquhart was officially inducted into his new charge at St. Mungo's on Thursday August 10th at 7.00pm. The Rev Neil Dougall led the service with members of the Presbytery. The Rev Aniko Schütz Bradwell preached the sermon

From the Manse - The Rev John Urguhart

Dear friends

I have just started as parish minister at St Mungo's, so I thought my first letter should give you some information about my family and me, so you can get to know us a little better.



was brought up in an old, chilly manse in the West Highlands, in the village of Arisaig, so we're glad now to be in a snug, warm, modern manse, for which we thank you all very much. Thank you



too for your warm welcome and many gifts to us. Thank you also for your help and encouragement to the 'newbies'.

My wife, Rebeca (one b, one c, as it is the Spanish spelling of the name) is from Lima in Peru and works as a public service interpreter for the NHS, Edinburgh City Council, the courts and other agencies. The third member of our household, David, who'll be 15 this month, is a keen cyclist and photographer. He'll be helping gradually to fill a wall in St Mungo's with photos and names of people in our church community

I came to faith in Christ at an early age, partly through a child's picture book about Jesus' parable of the lost sheep. Puzzling over this, I asked questions about Jesus, which led to a prayer on the hearth rug at home in which I asked Jesus to come into my life. Later on, I was a volunteer with Scripture Union and Urban Saints, and then an elder. I began to think seriously about ministry of word and sacrament, after my own minister suggested it. My late father and my grandfather were also ministers, and so I'm the third generation to study divinity at Edinburgh's New College, though we all had other careers before training for ministry. For twelve years, I worked for the charity, Age Concern Scotland (as it was called then), developing a special library and latterly managing their website.

Looking forward

On Sundays, for around eight weeks, we are taking a look at the apostle Peter's experience of being discipled by Jesus, from his growing faith and obedience to his experience of failure and forgiveness. It is a pattern of hope for all of us. Do join us for that, if you can, or listen on the website.

I would like you to mull over two quotations that I've been thinking about. The first is from Mike Breen, quoted in a paper on 'Understanding Missional Church' for the Presbytery of Lothian, who says this:

A missional church... is the new car that everyone is talking about right now, but no matter how beautiful or shiny the vehicle, without an engine, it won't go anywhere. So what is the engine of the church? Discipleship. I've said it many times: If you make disciples [Matthew 28:19], you will always get the church. But if you try to build the church, you will rarely get disciples.

The second quotation is older: it comes from the pen of Amy Carmichael (1867-1951), who had a remarkable ministry for Christ in India:

Many have forgotten that unofficial witness-bearing used to be the chief way by which the good news went around the world. [e.g. Acts 11] I tell you, and you believe and receive and tell someone else, and he tells others. Frank, vital telling in ordinary language that the Lord Jesus Christ lives and loves, and can save and keep, and can be known like a real friend, and is a Master who gives real orders and strength to carry them out.

Please think and pray about these things as we explore them together.

Only a good search in the bag found


